Change is never easy, especially when we are all concerned and uncertain about what the future holds.


But like I told you earlier I have been most impressed with you, to a higher degree that has inspired me. You have so much tradition, history, resources and potential at your fingertips.

### THE 2019 REPORT OF THE SESSION


#### Session Actions

- Received the report of the Emergency Preparedness Task Force and approved recommended actions. The Task Force was dissolved with gratitude for their service. The security plan is in place and the congregation has transitioned to the changes in building access. Staff has been trained in the needed aspects of the safety plan.
- Received the recommendation of the Worship Task Force to unify Sunday Morning Worship to a single service at 9:30 AM for the months of September through May and voted to approve the resulting new Sunday morning schedule. The task force was dissolved with gratitude for their service.
- Established a Director of Christian Education Search Committee to address the resignation of Tiffany McClure.

#### Presbytery Actions

- Administrative Commission resourced and advised and assisted Session to:
  - Establish a Personnel Committee and return the duty of Governance to the Session.
  - Updated the Operations Manual and Bylaws to reflect current practices of the Personnel Committee, and clarify processes.
  - Complete the Interim Head of Staff search process, culminating in Mark Galbraith beginning his ministry and work among us on August 1, 2019. Officially approved by vote of the Presbytery on September 21, 2019.
  - Author a list of questions for a potential Synod Administrative Review of the decisions and actions surrounding the removal of Rev. Richard Miller.
- The Administrative Commission assigned to resource FPC Davenport's Session, concluded its working relationship with Session and was formally dissolved by Presbytery on November 21, 2019.
- On motion, by the Session at the December 2019 meeting, decreed that anyone involved in the current ecclesiastical judicial process will not be eligible to serve FPC Davenport in a leadership role as a seated Elder or serve on standing Session committees for the year 2020.

### ADMINISTRATIVE COMMISSION REPORT

A Commission of the Presbytery

For most of 2019, Davenport's Session was backed up by a group of several pastors and ruling elders from other large congregations in the Presbytery of East Iowa. Formed as an "Administrative Commission in Support of First Presbyterian Church, Davenport," the group was tasked with walking alongside FPC ruling elders as the congregation transitioned from the ending of a 10-year pastorate to the leadership of a qualified interim pastor.

During that time, the Administrative Commission worked with the Davenport Session to:

- Establish a new Personnel Committee, one charged with developing a comprehensive plan for dealing with staff reviews and conflict management.
- Help update FPC's Operations Manual to be in keeping with the Book of Order and principles of Presbyterian polity.
- Begin the dialogue between the Session and Presbytery leaders concerning the events of the past and ways to move forward.
- Encourage and support FPC's efforts to participate more fully in the broader denomination on the Presbytery, Synod, and General Assembly levels.
- Serve as advocates and liaisons during the interim pastor search that led to a contract with the Rev. Mark Galbraith.

With Pastor Mark in place by August 2019, the bridgework tasked to the Administrative Commission was largely complete. In November 2019, the Presbytery granted our request to dissolve the group, with thanks. Since that time, several former commission members have been willing to serve individually in whatever was asked of us by the Presbytery, the Session, or Pastor Mark. We will continue to be on speed-dial as needed as Davenport readies itself to begin the important work of searching for a new installed pastor.

### LIBRARY COMMITTEE

**Mission:** We continue to support our mission – to further the welfare of the congregation by providing religious resources, informational and recreational reading books for members and church friends of all ages.

We met our goals set by the committee for 2019:

- Continued support of the worship bags monthly providing books = 132 books.
- Continued to provide current, relevant large-print, adult and children's books.
- Committed to a year-long project to evaluate the collection which has included checking every book and relabeling most.
- Reminded church members and church friends to check out books using the check-out system and return books when finished to keep them available for others.

Library statistics: Total = 396

- Worship Bags = 132

Library acquisitions: Total = 135

- New book = 51
- Donations = 84

Our committee worked over 600+ hours this year on up-dating our collection – checking every book, relabeling, and making corrections to complete the accuracy of our collection and our records. The committee added notebooks with current listings of all books by sections to make it easier for library users to search for books. We also moved all fellowship to Wednesday nights in hopes that our older kids would be able to participate on a more regular basis.

In October our youth collectively made 80 pairs of non-skid slipper socks for our Homecoming Meal guests. They also attended a haunted house. They led worship in December for Christmas Eve 4pm service. They decided this year to be leaders and participants rather than put on a play.

### **Purposes and 2019 Goals:**

CDF updated the committee's Mission and Vision Statement at our July 2019 meeting in preparation for the 2019-2020 academic year of activities. The statements had not been reviewed and updated since March of 2014. Our key responsibilities are:

- To develop and update a written Action Plan for the committee annually which supports the CDF Vision and Mission Statements, as well as the Long Range Strategic Plan of the church.
- Nurturing all the fellowship groups within the church, helping to communicate and promote the activities of each group to the congregation, and encouraging active participation in all.
- Establishing new fellowship groups and/or activities where there is sufficient interest.

- Planning and hosting the Manna & More fellowship breakfasts on the second Sunday of every month during the academic year.
- Participating in the annual FPC February Boy Scout Sunday celebration by inviting our local Boy Scout Troop T-7 to assist in the preparation and serving of our breakfast that month.
- Coordinating with the CEFY Committee to host a "Franks for the Memories" lunch on Youth Sunday, April 28. Grilled hot dogs and potluck side dishes and desserts were enjoyed by all.
- Organizing and pictorially documenting the eagerly anticipated annual Blessing of the Animals worship service.
- Planning and hosting the Bix 7 Race Concession featuring beverages and donuts.
- Hosting the Bix Sunday Jazz Liturgy services.
- Organizing and serving pies at the Thanksgiving Eve Pie Fellowship.

#### New activities and events in 2019 were:

- Planning and hosting several good-bye and welcome receptions for new and outgoing FPC staff members. We sadly said good-bye and thank you to our Youth Pastor, Tiffany McClure, and we welcomed our Interim Pastor, Rev. Mark Galbraith.
- Implementing and hosting two "Food for the Soul" Sunday evening worship services with potluck dinners to encourage fellowship.
- Planning and hosting a Octoberfest Craft Brewery Fellowship Tour on October 19.
- Establishing a new coffee hour fellowship program after the Sunday worship service. "Celebration Station" is a volunteer program in which a different church member commits to providing treats (baked goods or similar) each Sunday in celebration or in honor of a significant personal event.



### FINANCE COMMITTEE

A Committee of Session



The year ending 2019 has a \$67,672 positive balance from our operations. Pledges totaling \$661,738 were slightly higher than budget by \$3,538 and offerings were higher than budget by \$48,102. Other income revenue (which also includes Deacons', Mission Connection, and Associate Pastor Income) was lower than budget by \$2,424. Non-compensation expenses totaling \$245,122 include \$63,000 for utilities and property/liability insurance. Non-compensation expenses were \$45,655 below budget. This does not include the \$95,000 of custodial funds that were used for operating expenses. If custodial accounts had not been used, non-compensation expenses would have been \$49,345 over budget. A custodial account is an earmarked savings account meant to be used for a specific, limited purpose. Compensation expenses totaling \$589,097 were \$75,130 under budget. This is attributed to the reduction or elimination of staff positions. In addition, the timing of Mark Galbraith's arrival compared to the timing in the budget resulted in a lower compensation expense. Some notable projects in 2019 were Phase 1 of the stained glass window repair project (funded by Capital Maintenance Endowment Fund and memorial funds), building security system (funded by Capital Forward in Faith program and the Capital Maintenance Endowment Fund), refrigerator (funded by Capital Maintenance Endowment Fund) and computer and Wi-Fi upgrades.

The Capital "Forward in Faith" program ended in 2019. The remaining funds totaling \$8,530 were used for our new building security system. In summary, the total expenditures for the completed projects are \$871,974 for the past fourteen years.


In June 2019, the biennial review of the church's *Agreed Upon Procedures* was performed. An independent audit firm performed a detailed review of the financial procedures, controls and checks and balances of the financial affairs of the church. The report noted that the preparation and review of the account reconciliations need to be timelier. Otherwise, our procedural controls remain good. We will revert to an annual review due to hiring finance manager, Kristine Olson. This is a common practice.

At the time of this report, the proposed 2020 general budget reflects a \$11,900 surplus and has not been approved by Session. The proposed budget reflects two pastors instead of three and reduced mission expenses due to not supporting the Boys and Girls Club. As a recap of the 2020 stewardship campaign: there are 399 families. We have 193 giving units that pledged \$637,298 and one-time gifts totaling \$38,000. As a comparison, in 2019 we had 224 giving units pledging \$658,200. The pledge numbers exclude the Associate Pastor fund which has a balance of \$154,571 at December 31, 2019. We are prayerful that congregational members who have not pledged will continue to give to the church during 2020. Pledges are welcome throughout the year. Session will be reviewing the proposed 2020 budget at its March meeting.

New Member Inquiries which are informal lunch get-togethers for non-members to learn about membership opportunities were held on February 10, May 5, and November 10. Prior to these New Member Inquiries, written invitations were sent and follow up emails or phone contacts were made to encourage attendance. Congregational members were solicited and assigned to serve as mentors to those who chose to become members. The mentors hosted the new members at the Manna & More on New Member Sundays and checked on them a month later to see if they had any questions or concerns. In 2019, 14 new adult members joined the church.

On November 10, 28 Worship Hosts (ushers) attended a training event and lunch. A review of Worship Host responsibilities including the use of the new FPC security monitor was discussed. Chuck Gipson, Quality & Education Manager for Medic Ambulance Service conducted a Trauma First Aid and Hands on CPR Training for the Worship Hosts.

The Worship Host Schedule for 2020 was organized and has a full slate of six Worship Hosts for every Sunday service throughout the coming year. Hosts were asked to sign up for six Sundays a year by hosting on the 1st, 2nd, 3rd, or 4th Sundays of the even months or the odd months. There is also a 5th Sunday team which serves four times


I came that they may have life, and have it abundantly. – John 10:10

This fall, our stewardship campaign examined our abundant life in Jesus Christ. Together we examined the various ways that we as a congregation can, and do, make an impact on our community, both locally and across the globe through our abundance. Luke 6:38 tells us, give, and it will be given to you. They will pour into your lap a good measure – pressed down, shaken together, and running over. For by your standard of measure it will be measured to you in return. Each year, funding for our various missions and our talented staff comes directly from our stewardship campaign.

Our stewardship campaign goal for this fall was \$850,000. The stewardship and finance committees worked together to determine the financial support required to keep FPC operating at status quo. Funding for our Associate Pastor currently comes from a separate fund. Moving forward, expenses related to employing an associate pastor are being included in our stewardship campaign goals. We need to work toward the goal of incorporating associate pastor funding into our general operating budget sooner, rather than later, so we can continue to support our Associate Pastor in her wonderful work.

This year, 180 pledges totaled \$605,488. As part of our campaign, we received three additional one-time gifts totaling \$38,000. Combined, our stewardship campaign will contribute \$643,488 to the 2020 budget. Far from the results we hoped. We are down 44 pledging units and \$14,712. A heartfelt thank you to those of our congregation that pledged. You demonstrate great generosity and commitment to the mission and future of FPC.

We hope those who have pledged in the past and those who have not pledged in the past will give prayerful consideration to what they can give throughout 2020, in praise and thanks to God. Pledges are welcome throughout the year, and every pledge is important — however modest. Pledges can be made by calling the church office, by filling out a pledge card and placing it in the offering plate on Sunday, or by pledging online at www.fpcdavenport.org. As a reminder, those who have pledged online in the past must go online each year to renew their pledges; pledges from previous years are not automatically renewed.

### CHRISTIAN EDUCATION TASK FORCE

A Task Force of the Session

The Christian Education Task Force began meeting July 30, 2019. From July through December, the task force met regularly to work toward finding a Christian Education Director. Katie Styrt was the staff liaison and then Mark Galbraith when Katie went on maternity leave. Task force members were Diane Roebuck, Sarah Greim, Al Frolich, Paul Hartmann, and Jeff Ehrmann. Initially, we worked on the job description by starting with the existing description and developing two descriptions to serve the purpose of searching for both a pastoral candidate and a non-pastoral candidate. After both job descriptions were developed and approved by Session, the non-pastoral job description was posted in several recruitment sites. Session voted to approve the task force as Pastoral Nominating Committee and the members focused on writing a Ministry Information Form (MIF) to be posted for a pastoral search. The MIF was approved by Session and Presbytery and posted in mid-December.

We received seven responses to the non-pastoral advertising. The task force reviewed the applications and followed up with two qualified candidates, one local and one from New York. The local candidate withdrew their application after considering the conflicts in their schedule. The candidate flew in for a tight schedule of interviews and meetings in early December. This candidate has strong credentials and was well received. The committee was prepared to bring this candidate to Session with only a few reservations because of a lack of other candidates. At the December Session meeting, the lack of funding for the position put the task force work on hold. The MIF was posted for the pastoral position shortly after the Session meeting and the PCUSA system only matched us with one non-pastoral candidate.

### TECH TASK FORCE

A Task Force of the Session

This past year has been busy - many activities managed and projects implemented:

- With the End of Life and Support for Windows 7, the Church's computers were upgraded to devices that run Windows 10.
- Several software packages that are used to support the activity of the church were also upgraded. These include Sibelius, QuarkXpress, and Church Windows.
- The implementation process has started for Breeze, a church management application that will be targeted toward membership service.
- The Sanctuary sound environment was improved with the replacement of the old speakers with smaller upgraded speakers. The sound systems that drive the speakers are being reconfigured to improve the quality and control of audio in the sanctuary.
- The church's website, fpcdavenport.org, was redesigned with the assistance of Twin State Technical Services. The redesign combined the two existing church website into one cohesive site that allows for easy maintenance and support for both mobile and desktop viewing.

- The segmented wifi network in the church was consolidated into two wireless networks for improved security and ease of access.
- Computer backup systems are currently under review.
- The HD video recording equipment in the Sanctuary was maintained.
- Sunday services are recorded using HD digital video and audio equipment. The recordings are distributed to homebound members and are also uploaded to the church's Vimeo channel. The videos are also available on the church's website. DVD copies are also available for check-out in the church library. An edited version of the Sunday service is provided to a local cable media provider and is broadcast weekly on their public access channel.
- Digital signage in the narthex is updated weekly with time-relevant information and events.
- The projection screen in the Sanctuary is used to enhance the services and events held in the space.
- Recordings of baptisms are sent to the families. Recordings of wedding services and funeral services are also available by request.
- The church library database is available to search on the church's website.
- Countless hours of technician volunteer hours were provided by a dedicated group of skilled church members.

### Worship Task Force

A Task Force of the Session


The Worship Task Force was created by Session in 2018. The scope of work taken on by the task force included discerning the advisability of having one Sunday morning worship service or two, determining if we should recommend a different worship service and time/day/location in addition to our current traditional worship service, recommend how we might increase the sense of community within the congregation through worship, and to revisit the Envision 20/20 report to further incorporate their work into the life of the Church, specifically the God-sized Dream for Worship &Music. In the fall of 2018, the Task Force recommended to the Session a Sunday morning schedule that included a single worship service. We were in the process of evaluating congregational feedback on this proposal, when we suspended our activity due to our interim period. On invitation from Interim Pastor Galbraith, we restarted our work in August 2019. We re-evaluated our prior work and following a second congregation-wide comment period we affirmed our recommendation to Session for a single Sunday morning worship service. The Session approved the recommendation in October 2019. The following six weeks was used to publicize and implement the new schedule. The first Sunday of the new schedule was December 1, 2019. The Task Force is currently attending to the additional tasks listed above. Thanks to those who served on the Task Force in 2019: Pat Cresap, Marty Bowles Edwards, Mike Ferris, Sarah Greim, Mark Jones, Jane Magnuson, Jeanne Sherwood, Matt Bishop, Pastor Katie Styrt, Pastor Mark Galbraith. Brock Earnhardt, Jed Steckel, and Patrick Downey served on the Task Force in 2018.

### Mission Connection

A Committee of the Deacons

**Purpose:** Mission Connection promotes and coordinates FPC mission efforts and partnerships to share Christ's love with people outside the Quad Cities area.

- AMKA AFRIKA SCHOOL TANZANIA (Karen Moore) Contact and fiscal information with this mission project was lost in 2019. Ann, mission project contact, removed herself from this school and its support in early 2019. Heeding her advice, our committee chose to discontinue support of this school for 2019.
- ILUGUA GUATEMALA (Craig Foster) The annual contribution of \$1,800 was sent to support ILUGUA's general budget in 2019. A trip in October 2019 disclosed that ILUGUA's major supporter was reorganizing, and staff at ILUGUA were working without funding since May. We attended a seminar at ILUGUA headquarters in La Trementina which focused on preparing community leaders to be spiritual lay leaders in their communities. We were able to discuss with them on an intimate basis the impact of climate change on their crops and the issue of migration from Guatemala to surrounding countries and the US. Much, if not all, of our support in 2019 was used to give small stipends to ILUGUA workers and maintain its physical plant in La Trementina. Additionally, the monies earmarked for AMKA (\$800) was donated to ILUGUA to sustain its much needed presence in Guatemala and among its indigenous peoples, as well as the year end balance of our discretionary funds in the sum of \$626. A trip in October 2020 (?) is being discussed, and we encourage members to consider join us.
- KIDS AGAINST HUNGER (Cindy Schalk) In February, FPC members packaged 5,400 meals in our on-going support to end hunger worldwide. Our youth groups are the major force working on Sunday and Wednesday evenings. They are enthusiastic and so helpful. We will be moving the date for 2020 back to the April time frame.
- PASUR PAKISTAN SCHOOL FOR MEN (Sharon Simmonds) As this project moves forward, your support of \$1,000 was given with dollars earmarked for scholarship purposes for children wishing to attend but without funds for tuition. A possible trip to Pakistan to view the school and learn more about its impact is being discussed for 2020.
- NEIGHBOR TO NEIGHBOR (Rosemary Jamison) This is a replacement mission for the now defunct Churches United CareLINK program. Knowing the pressing need for financial aid in our neighborhood, we were fortunate to find The Center which has an ongoing program very similar.... once a year assistance for utilities and rent. Monies given to support this project in 2019 totaled \$7,200.



- Blind Womens Club of Zimbabwe, Alice Chikomo continues to minister to approximately 22 blind women and their children. She is joined in this mission by her grandson, Christian, as well as Nebatah, a child Alice rescued from the streets of Harare. The ladies are taught to sew and knit. Food and cleaning supply packages are given to the women every two weeks. \$1,400 was contributed to this organization in 2019.
- TABITHA'S CIRCLE (Sharon Simmonds) An exciting opportunity developed when a church member arranged to invite neighborhood ladies interested in helping with this project to come see and join the group. Typically, items sewn are taken to the Brookside Sewers where they are combined with their completed items and then shipped to the Little Dresses For Africa headquarters in Brownstown, Michigan. They are then sized and sorted for delivery to various locations across the globe. In 2018, we were able to save the shipping cost dollars by transporting items to Michigan with another local group who offered to take ours along with theirs. We have found an alternative method of transporting finished dresses/shorts to Michigan again in 2019, so dollars spent are a mere \$93 for material and supplies.
- New Kingdom Trailriders (Cassie Woods) Located in Sherrard, Illinois, this project aids youth and adults who struggle with physical and mental challenges to develop strength and confidence atop a 1,200 pound horse! Director, Jodie Barton, spoke through our ACE program about NKT in a well attended and enthusiastic hour. We are hoping to help them with "sweat equity" (volunteers) along with a 2019 monetary donation of \$500.

### **OUTREACH COMMITTEE**

#### **PUNCH (People Uniting Neighbors and Churches):**

Easter Egg Hunt (annual): Deacons cooked, placed in bun and wrapped 1,000 hotdogs; donated two children's bikes; and, served at the Easter Egg Hunt.

Thanksgiving Dinner (200 people served) (annual): Deacons provided food and volunteers at the event.

Blessing Box: Congregation donated toiletries and cleaning supplies. Volunteered at KWQC TV station for citywide collections.

Urban Hilltop Garden Taste: Deacons baked zucchini bread and served to community to utilize vegetables from PUNCH gardens.

PUNCH Spring Fling: We volunteered at yard sale/festival held at First Baptist Church.

#### **Churches United:**

Monthly Meal: Congregation members prepared and served 11 monthly meals to over 475 individuals at the Zion Lutheran meal site in Davenport. This site seems to be handling more individuals than the former site.

Food Pantry (The Center) (monthly): Our 2019 monetary donations were \$3,453 and item donations were 1,281 food items.

First Presbyterian Church was not involved in CROP Walk this year.

#### **Paper Hearts:**

Paper Hearts in February 2019 was its third year. Congregation members donated toilet paper for Humility of Mary. We collected 673 rolls of toilet paper. Our goal of 1,500 was not met. The weather and other fund drives at church were the causes of the decease in collections.

#### **Angel Tree:**

Bethany was the source of our successful Angel Tree Program again this year. The congregation donated unwrapped gifts and Bethany wrapped and delivered the gifts. 100 people were gifted! We were also able to do family groups this year.

#### **Neighborhood Picnic:**

The largest single event for the Outreach committee was the Neighborhood Picnic in June. Emphasis was placed on including our neighbors. It was a successful event. Approximately 200 church members and/or neighbors were served. We again made use of a tent and because of its popularity, we will probably increase the size/number of tents.

#### **Beauty on the Boulevard:**

This project involves maintaining a flower bed on Kirkwood Blvd. at Pershing Street (seasonal). It was planted with basic plants this season and will be enhanced in 2020. In participation with the City of Davenport. Outreach will also maintain the Iowa/Kirkwood bed in 2020.

#### **Ministries:**

- Communion to the Farthest Pew provided services to homebound and/or assisted living church members throughout 2019. Volunteers assisted the Pastor with the services.
- The Funeral Support team served meals and/or refreshments following several memorial services at First Presbyterian Church.
- The In Touch ministry continues with personal contact to +/- 19 church members; gift bags are given to them at Easter and Christmas.
- The PCSD committee works with other Deacon committees for the all-church picnic. We also support Health Ministries, Prayer Ministries and the Prayer Shawl Ministry.
- The annual Homecoming Dinner was held with a catered buffet dinner (Bridges Catering) serving approximately 80 guests. Transportation was available for those guests who requested it. Approximately 175 invitations were mailed to those church members were are 75 years old and older prior to the October event. Desserts were donated (pies from Village Inn). Entertainment was provided by the Kirkwood Singers, comprised of men from the church choir and accompanied by Matt Bishop. Volunteers included youth groups and other committee members. This continues to be one of our popular events.

### Boy Scout Troop No. 7

A Sponsored Mission of First Presbyterian Church

**Purpose:** As a local mission of First Presbyterian Church since 1912, our goals are to provide a scouting experience for the boys of FPC and the community. This experience provides youth a chance to go on monthly outings while developing leadership and citizenship skills.
