



A Letter from Pastor Mark

God's beloved people at First Presbyterian Church:

I am announcing that the way has been made clear for me to accept a new call to serve as interim pastor out west closer to home. Given the needs of FPC-D that have surfaced during our time together, I am in full support of the call for a bridging pastor to assist FPC-D with next steps towards reconciliation and healing in this interim and transitional journey. This announcement thus serves as my 30 day notice, per contract agreement.

My last Sunday with you will be Sunday, September 6.

It has been my pleasure to partner with you as Interim Pastor, Head of Staff, and Moderator of the Session.

I am pleased with all we've accomplished in our time together. The "Divine Drama overview of the Bible and Christian teaching" class was highly successful, with faithful attendance. The Personnel Committee defined and sharpened its identity and tasks, as well as established a staff review process. The mission study groups were well attended, highly positive, and broadly-stated mission goals for the next chapter of ministry were articulated and presented.

I was very happy to see that much needed beachheads in reestablishing a positive relationship between the congregation and Presbytery have begun. The groundwork for a much-needed reconciliation process was laid. We negotiated through staff re-organization and staff stability was re-established.

You have been through a very difficult and challenging time, but already you are on the road towards reconciliation and healing. I'm confident that as the Presbytery Of East Iowa, your bridging pastor, the Session, the staff, and of course, you the great and holy people of FPC-D, join hands together, you will be successful into preparing yourselves to be in the best position of strength and health to interview for your next called and installed lead pastor and head of staff.

I wish to thank first of all the staff for their collegiality, support, and teamwork. Thanks also of course to the Session leadership and deacons, and the congregation for your love, care support, and prayers.

The Presbytery and I have already been in conversation about additional short term pastoral help until you have called and installed your bridging pastor. The Presbytery will continue to work aggressively with your session to help fill the short term need.

Please know that you'll continue to be in my prayers. Please keep me in yours as well.

Pastoral Statement

Dear Partners in Ministry at First Presbyterian Church:

For your convenience and review, here is a statement from Dr. Rebecca Blair, Stated Clerk of the PEI, following up from the Congregational Meeting July 26:

What is a Bridging Pastor?

The bridging pastor process allows carefully selected pastors and churches to be matched through the partnership of the Ministers and Congregations Commission and a special search committee working on behalf of the church. The Bridging Pastor is an experienced pastor with a particular skill set, contracted in a Temporary Pastoral Relationship, who serves in complex or conflicted transitional ministry settings. This pastor's role is to serve as a bridge following the early phase of the interim process in which conflicts and church cultural features are identified and engaged by an interim pastor and the church session, and working through the later phase of the interim process that focuses on systemic renewal and relational reconciliation. The aim of this service is to complete the preparation process for the congregation to call an installed pastor.

In accord with the PEIA policy on Temporary Pastoral Relationships, the Bridging Pastor relationship shall be established by contract between the session of the church to be served and the pastor, as full-time pastoral service, reviewed on a yearly basis by the session in partnership with the MCC with the contract to be approved by the MCC before the contract becomes effective.

What is the Process to Call a Bridging Pastor?

The process for selecting a Bridging Pastor begins with the selection of a Bridging Pastor Search Committee for the specific task of selecting a Bridging Pastor only. The Presbytery's Ministers and Congregations Commission provides guidance to the Bridging Pastor Search Committee concerning the essential skill set of the Bridging Pastor articulated in the documentation to be shared with potential candidates. The MCC and the Bridging Pastor Search Committee partner to carefully consider 2-3 candidates whom the MCC has identified. Only these candidates may be considered.

In choosing to use the Bridging Pastor option, the session is agreeing to select one of the candidates offered by the Presbytery's MCC. Once established, this relationship will be reviewed by the MCC for renewal annually to ensure that the agreed-upon activities are taking place, the ministry is benefitting the church, and the terms of contract are agreed upon.

Temporary Pastoral Relationships are defined by G-2.0504b and c in the Book of Order. These relationships shall be established by contract between the session of the church to be served and the pastor for one-year increments and shall be approved by MCC on behalf of the Presbytery before such contracts become effective. Any extension of such contract may be entered into by the session and the pastor and shall be approved by MCC before becoming effective. Such approval shall not be granted by MCC until after an acceptable review of the ministry is conducted.

Drive-In Communion and Evening Prayer - Wednesdays at 7:00 PM

It's been far too long without sharing communion, so please join us for a drive-in communion service Wednesdays at 7:00 PM! To make this prayer service as safe as possible, it'll be very different from our Sunday morning services. The service will only last about 15 minutes, so that attendees can comfortably keep their car windows up (you are encouraged to turn off your car engine). The service will be broadcast over FM radio. There will be no printed bulletins - instead, the order of worship will be sent out via the e-news each week. Each household will bring their own bread and juice, so that we can't spread disease via communion elements. There will also be a box for depositing offerings on the way out of the parking lot. We'd love to see you at the service, this Wednesday or any Wednesday after!

- Approved and forwarded to the congregation a slate of candidates for the Bridging Pastor Nominating Committee.
