



- More good news on our opening of the church building! On the recommendation of the Pandemic Task Force, the Session approved building use to church groups of any size. Masks will be required. Please submit a Building Use Form to reserve your time and place.
- Approved the use of FPC for a Scott County Health Dept sponsored vaccine clinic for June 30.
- Elders Heather Calvert,
 Paula Burnett, and Karla
 Ruiter will represent FPC at the July Presbytery meeting.
- Approved a final Bridging Pastor contract and job description for Pastor Kathy Stoner-Lasala.
- The Synod-Presbytery-FPC committee has come to a verbal agreement with a reconciliation facilitator. The Session approved the principles of a contract with the facilitator. It is anticipated that she will begin her work with us soon.
- An in-person pastoral care restart is being looked into as facilities open to visitors.
- The Session will not meet in July as committees work individually on tasks related to the Synod ARC recommendations for FPC.



Due to changes to our COVID protocols, we have decided to move the PAS production of Guys and Dolls back into the sanctuary. A Unique Opportunity for Spiritual Development that Creates Christian Community: A Listening Campaign

When First Presbyterian Church adopted the Envisioning 2020 Report, one of the God-sized dreams we affirmed was spiritual development which we described as: to explore our faith, to realize our gifts, to experience God's love, to engage spiritual practices, to create Christian community and to employ discernment in decision-making.

Even before we convened the Envisioning 2020 process, a group of church members had begun to dream about forming a social justice task force. Along the way, this group learned that Quad Cities Interfaith offers a training program that teaches deep listening skills to build relationships in one-to-one settings. One of the roles QCI plays in the community is offering trainings that help to strengthen congregations by allowing them to fulfill their missions and realize their vision in a more powerful way. QCI's experience has been that the skills acquired in a Listening Campaign would be critical to creating a social justice advocacy movement at First Pres.

While Listening Campaigns vary in size and scope from congregation to congregation, there are 2 common outcomes: **1)** Establishing and Deepening Relationships Among Members; and **2)** Answers to Questions the Lead to Alignment of Vision, Mission, and Ministry.

Remarkably, our God-size dream of spiritual development seeks the same outcomes as a Listening Campaign. (Actually, that's just the way God works!) When the people yearning for a social justice task force shared their dream with Pastor Kathy, she saw that two other groups in the congregation would be enriched by Listening Campaign training. These groups were CEFY (who need to discern the shape/form/purpose of a youth and children's staff position that will include community engagement); and Deacons Outreach Committee (who hear God's call to engage more deeply and effectively with our neighborhood around such issues as gun violence).

And that's not all. This training prepares the Listeners to deepen relationships with persons they already know and to establish relationships with persons they don't know as well. In congregations, it can be easy to have superficial relationships. One might know where a person works or the car he/she drives, but not know his/her story, hopes and fears, dreams and disasters that shape life and bind us to our faith/values. Through deepening relationships, congregations can build a stronger community. It is only in true community that a collective vision can be realized.

Is there someone in your life you haven't connected with over the long months of the pandemic? The skills developed in our Listening Campaign training will help breathe new and authentic life into that relationship. Is there a relationship in your life which is disturbed or conflicted? Listening Campaign training will show you how to engage with the other person in a way that opens you to each other's heart. Do you want to deepen your walk with Jesus by practicing his incarnational ministry? Jesus meets us where we are (as good a definition of the incarnation as any), and one-on-one deep listening skills will help you to be "Jesus with skin on" with another.

Some have asked how Listening Campaign training is different from the Mission Study conducted by Pastor Mark during his interim ministry with First Pres. The finished product of the Mission Study led by Pastor Mark is a compilation of Presbyterians who stated "this is what I think/feel/believe." The Listening Campaign's result would be the opposite, "This is what my neighbor thinks and feels God's spirit is speaking into their life and, because we are in relationship, into our life together."

Others have asked, "Do we need to learn deep listening as a spiritual practice?" Taking the time to re-read the Envisioning 20/20 report's section on Spiritual Development, a generous assessment would be to say we've addressed one third of the Spiritual Development goals we set for ourselves. We have left the majority of our Spiritual Development dreams sitting on the table. Its no coincidence that God's still small voice has found another way to call us back to the Spiritual Development commitment we made back in 2016.

Interested? Curious? Intrigued? On Sunday afternoon, July 11, we will be blessed when QCI offers Listening Campaign training right here at First Pres. Our training (you may choose in person or hybrid zoom format) will begin at 1:00 p.m. and wind up at 6:00 p.m; we'll offer pandemic-safe snacks. Whether you're in the social justice task force group, or CEFY, or the Deacons Outreach committee, or simply a pilgrim seeking to follow Jesus, if God's Spirit is whispering in your ear right now, you're welcome to join us!
