
We are a Matthew 25 church

Prayer of Confession



Lesson from the Hebrew Scriptures

Jeremiah 2:4-13 NRSV

Hear the word of the LORD, O house of Jacob, and all the families of the house of Israel. Thus says the LORD: What wrong did your ancestors find in me that they went far from me, and went after worthless things, and became worthless themselves? They did not say, "Where is the LORD who brought us up from the land of Egypt, who led us in the wilderness, in a land of deserts and pits, in a land of drought and deep darkness, in a land that no one passes through, where no one lives?" I brought you into a plentiful land to eat its fruit and its good things. But when you entered you defiled my land and made my heritage an abomination. The priests did not say, "Where is the LORD?" Those who handle the law did not know me; the rules transgressed against me; the prophets prophesied by Baal and went after things that do not profit.

Therefore, once more I accuse you, says the LORD, and I accuse your children's children. Cross to the coasts of Cyprus and look, send to Kedar and examine with care; see if there has ever been such a thing. Has a nation changed its gods, even though they are not gods? But my people have changed their glory for something that does not profit. Be appalled, O heavens, at this, be shocked, but utterly desolate, says the LORD, for my people have committed two evils: they have forsaken me, the fountain of living water, and dug out cisterns for themselves, cracked cisterns that can hold no water.

This is the Word of the Lord.

Gospel Lesson Luke 13: 10-17

On one occasion when Jesus was going to the house of the leader of the Pharisees to eat a meal on the sabbath, they were watching him closely. When he noticed how the guest chose the places of honor, he told them a parable. "When you are invited by someone to a wedding banquet, do not sit down at the place of honor, in case someone more distinguished than you has been invited by your host; and the host who invited both of you may come and say to you, 'Give this person your place,' and then in disgrace you would start to take the lowest place. But when you are invited, go and sit down at the lowest place, so that when your host comes, he may say to you, 'Friend, move up higher'; then you will be honored in the presence of all who sit at the table with you. For all who exalt themselves will be humbled, and those who humble themselves will be exalted." He said also to the one who had invited him, "When you give a luncheon or a dinner, do not invite your friends or your brothers or your relatives or rich neighbors, in case they may invite you in return, and you would be repaid. But when you give a banquet, invite the poor, the crippled, the lame, and the blind. And you will be blessed, because they cannot repay you, for you will be repaid at the resurrection of the righteous. "

Christ Jesus, though he was in the form of God, did not regard equality with God as something to be exploited, but emptied himself, taking the form of a slave, being born in human likeness. 

What are Small Groups?

A Small Group (minimum of three, maximum of 12 people) shares "our spiritual journeys together, offering time to explore, study, pray and care for one another." (Envisioning 2020 Report to the Session, p. 10)

What does a Small Group do?

A Small Group may form for "a defined task over a specified time period such as a book study" or missional engagement, or for an "open-ended time for topics such as on-going parenting discussions," long-term missional partnership or Bible study. (references in quotation marks drawn from the Envisioning 2020 Report to the Session, p. 10)

Why a Small Group?

Often larger groups tend to lose people in translation. However, smaller groups of our peers allow us to stop when needed, ask questions, converse amongst ourselves and hold one another accountable. We can add a little fun by naming our group, finding different places to meet, and just personalizing our group to make it our own.

Already Have a Small Group?

Several groups in our congregation function already as Small Groups.

Examples could be the Bible Basics 201 group or the Women of Hope Horizons Study group. Both groups are of the second Small Group type, an "open-ended time" without a stated closing date.

Interested in joining a Small Group?

Have a group that would like to be registered as a Small Group?

Simply sign up for yourself and your interests or for your existing group.

If you're signing up for yourself, church staff will connect you with others having similar interests.
