Welcome to First Presbyterian Church of Davenport, a church where EVERYONE is welcome. On behalf of the entire First Pres family, we want you to know that we are so glad you're here. We are a proud congregation of the Presbyterian Church (USA), where We Choose WELCOME!

We welcome followers of Jesus who are solid in their faith, and we welcome questioning believers seeking deeper meaning in their life. We welcome those who come from different faith backgrounds, such as Methodists, Lutherans, and Catholics, and those with no faith background at all; for we are all one in Christ Jesus. No matter where you are on your journey of faith, you are welcome here!

We hope you experience the warmth and friendliness of our congregation. It is a place that long-term members have described as their spiritual home for generations. It is also a place where people newer to our community of faith have found safe and sacred space for themselves and their families.

Nursery care is available during the worship service for children (birth through age 4). The nursery is staffed by trained and background-checked caregivers from 8:45 AM to 12:15 PM. The nursery is on the third floor of the CE building. Please ask a worship host if you need assistance locating this space.



Our Session (church council) has adopted a bold vision of creating safe and sacred space for all. We aren't perfect at it, but we are joyfully beginning to live into this new vision. We are an open and

affirming congregation, and a proud member of the Covenant Network of Presbyterians (covnetpres.org). The Session and members of First Pres extend a sincere welcome to all persons regardless of race, nationality, gender, or sexual orientation. This includes an open invitation to membership, the sacraments of baptism and communion, marriage, funerals, memorial services, and service as an officer of the church.



We are a Matthew 25 church in the PC(USA). Matthew 25 congregations identify themselves as working toward one or more of three goals: building congregational vitality, dismantling structural racism, and eradicating systemic poverty.

A Service of Choral Evensong A Note on Today's Service

While a new vehicle for worship at First Presbyterian, the practice and ongoing tradition of Choral Evensong dates back to sixteenth-century England (during the Tudor age). The actual liturgy, however, has its roots in much older sources. During the Middle Ages, early figures in the church (most notably St. Benedict) established a set series of prayers for all the days of the liturgical year, and more specifically for different times of the day, which became known as the canonical hours. The Evensong service that our Anglican brothers and sisters developed was a musical combination of the two final spoken prayer services of the day, Vespers and Compline. Since Evensong's inception, many important composers, mostly from England, have contributed a wealth of settings of the psalms and canticles (mostly in English) that feature so prominently in the service.

The service begins with a processional hymn, followed by a choral introit and a series of prayers. The choir, led by a cantor, follow a responsorial tradition dating back to the earliest days of ancient worship in reciting introductory sentences, followed by a spoken recitation of the daily psalm. After the prescribed first scriptural lesson for the day, the choir sings a setting of the Magnificat, the song of the Virgin Mary upon her visit to her cousin Elizabeth (from Luke 1). After the lesson from the Psalms, the choir sings a setting of the Nunc Dimittis, the song of Simeon upon seeing Jesus in the Temple at Jerusalem (from Luke 2). After the lessons and canticles, the congregation jointly recites the Apostle's Creed and the Lord's Prayer, divided by further responsorial declarations from the cantor and choir. Following a brief reflection from the pastor, the choir sings a final offertory anthem appropriate for the service and recesses during a final congregational hymn.

While the tradition of Choral Evensong is a lynchpin in the churches of England, it has slowly become more and more popular in this country and across a variety of liturgical denominations. It is our hope that you will be inspired by the musical presentations of the liturgy, allowed space for reflection on the words of the readings, and given a renewed sense of peace and light to carry with you into the week ahead and as we approach Holy Week.






